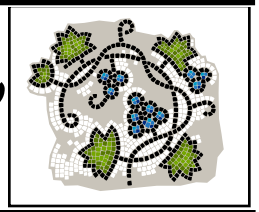

Christmas Day, Saturday, December 25th, we offer Holy Communion at 10:30 am.

Epiphany Pageant and Eucharist – Sunday, January 2nd at 10:30 am. We anticipate a visit from the Magi (wise people) and their friends. All children are welcome to participate.

Please join us in welcoming the King promised of old, a King not like the world knows, but One who brings among us the very peace and presence of God.

"We should do ducks and goats again this year!" proclaims Elise. She and her brother Sam are looking forward to this year's Sunday School Advent season project of earning money to buy goats through World Concern's Global Gift Guide. It will be the second time the children have participated in the Global Gift Guide campaign. Last year they and other St. Alban's children sold cookies at church and earned money from chores. They also made goat posters encouraging the rest of the congregation to join the effort. Their campaign inspired the Episcopal Church Women (ECW) to give generously for goats, and members of the Altar Guild gave some chickens. The result: eight goats and goat kits, plus some ducks and chickens, helping hungry families thrive in Haiti, Kenya and Bangladesh by producing food and income on a regular basis.

Asked if she enjoyed the project last year, Elise replied, "Yes, it was fun. I did it in Girl Scouts, too. We gave some money from our piggy banks and I did chores, like sweeping and cleaning my room. And sometimes I helped put dishes away." Elise's brother, Sam, helped out in the yard cleaning.

This year's goat and duck campaign will get underway at St. Alban's on November 28th, the first Sunday of Advent, with a special presentation in the Sunday School by Sarah Leech. Watch for signs of the children's campaign from that day onward. The Sunday School will sponsor a bake sale at the church on Sunday, December 12th. And just like last year, the children will be earning money at home to collect for goats and ducks. Says Elise, "I think it's going to help the world because the goats give milk and have babies, and they give milk too. And the people are going to love the pet."



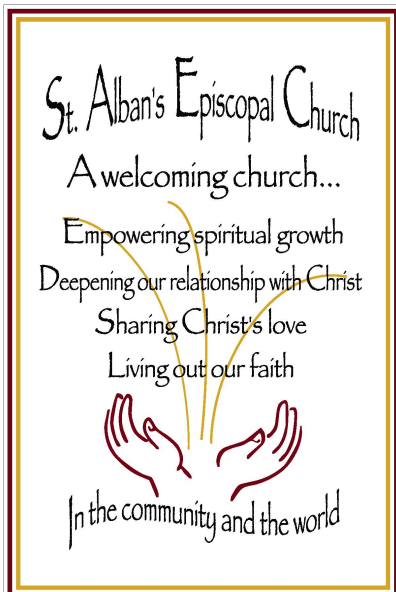

A Touch of Inner Healing - Thread of History *By Shirley Wilson*

During my phone conversation with Lisa Coale, it soon became evident that her connection with St. Alban's is a lot stronger than her current job as Parish Administrator might suggest. Although it was not apparent in the beginning, Lisa has been linked to us since birth in some way.

She was born in St. Petersburg, Florida, but the family left ten days later. Her dad was in the Air Force so there were frequent moves before his discharge when Lisa was two. He had been raised in Vancouver, B.C., so he looked for a place to settle his family that was close to his roots. When he saw the beautiful view of Puget Sound, driving down Main Street from Five Corners, he fell in love with Edmonds and bought their first home on Olympic View Drive.

That's when her mom started attending St. Alban's. Her friend and neighbor, Mary Lou Porter, was a member here and invited Lisa's mom to come to church with her. There were several Brits attending at the time which made her mom feel right at home, having been born in England. So Lisa attended St. Alban's all during her childhood until she married and moved to Snohomish for a couple of years. After a brief marriage and the birth of her daughter, Brenna, she came back in 1987 as a single mom.

She had previously worked for a local doctor at a Pathology Clinic through high school, then at the University Hospital after she graduated. She also worked at the Washington State Reformatory as a Registrar for Edmonds Community College. Her interest in the medical field came from both her mother and her father: Her dad was in biomedical electronics in the Air Force and later started his own biomedical electronics company. Her mother worked as a nurse at Five Corners for Dr. Robert Suchert. The conversation around the family's dinner table was usually about medical situations or politics.

Her parents' marriage ended when Lisa was fourteen. When she was eighteen, her mother married Dan Kidd who also attended St. Alban's and was the Boy Scout Leader of Troop #300. Sadly, he was diagnosed with terminal cancer five years later. That motivated Lisa to move back to this area so she could be closer to family and the area she was raised in. Coincidentally, the rectory had the same address as her mom's house, so Lisa had to make occasional trips to deliver mail to Fr. George Wilson. She ended up working with him for nearly eight years. In 1991, she married her husband, John Coale, a truck driver and construction worker. A year later, their daughter, Jennifer, was born. Finally, in 1994, when her third daughter, Grace, came along, Lisa decided to quit her job and stay home with her family.

When her children were older, she worked at different jobs in the corporate world, including property management. But when she took a job at St. Mathew's Lutheran Church, that used to be our neighbor on the corner, she realized that she prefers church work and helping people. Jeremiah Center was her next job but they were affected by budget constraints, limiting the number of hours she could work. So when she ran into some ECW ladies at a Cocoon House event, and later met Fr. John while walking Hound Dog, it was as though God was calling her back to St. Alban's once again. When I asked Lisa what she did for fun and relaxation she quickly told me about all the fun her family has had over the years camping on the peninsula, salmon fishing, and anything outdoors. She also enjoys antiques, gardening, home schooling, and her two year old grandson, Luke.

Altar Guild

As many of you may know the ladies of the Altar Guild are aging. Each week when we change the candle in the Sanctuary Light it is becoming more difficult to manage the large brass candle holder. It is very heavy and cumbersome. As beautiful as it is, it requires strength to lower and raise it. At one point, the ropes came off the track and it was very difficult to handle. If the brass is not raised high enough you are in danger of hitting your head. We need a Sanctuary Candle that is appropriate and visible to the entire congregation.

What we are proposing is to remove the current light and install on the wall, either beside or above the Ambry (the cupboard where the Reserve Sacrament is kept), a simple candle holder made of brass with a glass hurricane. The cost is under \$200 and the cost for the 7-8 day candles is less than we have been paying for the candles we currently use. We have made a request to the Vestry that the funds be used from the Memorial Fund.

You will be able to view the choice of the Altar Guild at the Annual Meeting. The glass hurricane is available in either clear or red glass.

Being the Church: Reading with Helki

Last Lent Bishop Greg encouraged us to read Reggie McNeal's book *Missional Renaissance: Changing the Scorecard for the Church*. I bought the book, but there it sat on my bookshelf. When the Evangelism Commission arranged for Reggie to be a speaker on November 13th, I thought since I had the book maybe I should go hear him speak. He started out explaining the definition of a missional church as the people of God partnering with Him in His redemptive mission in the world. He also discussed that the missional church is about shifting from internal focus to external focus and "being" the church in the community and world.

One of the examples he used about how to become connected in the community was working with a local school. He mentioned how achieving a reading comprehension at the fourth grade level is critical in predicting the future success or failure of a student. One of the Hands On outreach programs we have here at St. Alban's is volunteering at Cedar Valley Community School in Camille Hartley's classroom. Our own therapy dog, Helki, helps students improve their reading by listening to them read along with his able assistants Lorrie Pruitt, Barbara Halterman and Reilly Mannery. As I sat there listening to Reggie talk I realized *Reading with Helki* is a great example of "being" the church. Camille reports "We have a very big class this year (28!) so I don't get to read individually with each child as much as I'd like to. With families being as busy as they are these days, and many of our families speaking other languages, parents aren't always able to read with their kids at home either. Having extra ears (and hands and hearts) listening to kids read is so important and helpful for their reading growth. Plus, it's very fun and motivating for them to practice reading with a dog, especially one as nice as Helki! Lorrie reports that at the end of the school year in June, Helki received thank you notes prepared by the kids. If you would like to help or want more information, just ask any of those involved."

Today the rubble has been removed and a small temporary clinic has been reopened

Disaster 101 for Congregations

As part of its commitment to assist dioceses in developing local leadership in disaster preparedness and response, Episcopal Relief & Development has recently begun to offer diocesan-based training in basic disaster management for parishes and missions, and in partnership with the Diocese of Olympia, will present the first such workshop in the Pacific Northwest on **Friday and Saturday, January 7-8, 2011 at St. Stephen's Episcopal Church, Seattle.**

Anticipated topics in this initial training will include:

- Disaster terminology and the stages of the disaster cycle
- Disasters in the Pacific Northwest – historical and potential
- How individuals, congregations and communities are affected by a disaster
- The role of faith-based organizations in disaster response and recovery
- Parish/mission preparedness and mitigation •The church emergency plan and continuity of operations planning
- Identifying disaster response capabilities and volunteer management
- Working with other faith-based and community-based resources

Interested clergy and lay leaders from surrounding dioceses in the United States and Canada are also invited and encouraged to attend. Episcopal Relief & Development hopes that trainings like this will help build regional networks of congregation-based contacts for advice and assistance in both preparedness and disaster response and recovery.
