Call Committee Report

The St. Alban's call for a new priest was posted on the national website in early February with a closing date of April 30. We now have a good number of excellent candidates. **Emily Bee Part of History
In Election of New Diocesan Bishop**

Emily Bee, a member of our congregation, was a part of history for the Diocese of Western Washington during the recent election of the 8th bishop of the diocese. Emily attended the election as a Youth Presence, one of the youth delegates, who were able to cast a vote for the new bishop for the first time in diocesan elections.

I asked Emily to share a few of her thoughts with us about her opportunity to attend both last year's general convention and the recent election as our youth delegate:

Dan Mullene: This must have been a very exciting time for you, being a part of history. What does it feel like to be one of the first youth delegates to help elect the next bishop of the Diocese of Olympia?

Emily Bee: Well it was very exciting for me and all the other youth at the election. You could say we are "living history," how much better could it get than that? The election was a lot of fun and I had a great time.

DM: Did you have a chance to see Bishop-elect Gregory Rickel during the walk-about meetings held prior to the election? What did you like or dislike about him?

EB: Yes, I was able to see him at the Everett walkabout. Well what I liked about him was that he has past experience with youth and he seemed like a person who you could go to lunch with and chat with for the whole afternoon. I can't seem to remember something that I did not like about him except for maybe feeling that he was too inexperienced.

DM: What would you like to see the new Bishop focus on in the diocese, once he's in place?

EB: Well, I think that if the Bishop were to focus on something in the diocese he would lack in other things. But, I would enjoy seeing him at a High School Youth Conference (HYC), or any other youth-related event like HYC or 6-Day.

DM: What did you think of the election process? Did it go as you expected?

EB: I think that the election process was great. It went by smoothly and quickly. Before I knew it we had elected our new Bishop, with it only taking three ballots to decide. WOW! What more can any delegate ask for but a fun, exciting, song-filled election, that didn't take up the whole day.

DM: What was the best part about being an Official Youth Presence for the Diocese of Olympia?

EB: I think that the best part about being an Official Youth Presence is that I have an important role in our Diocese and I like hanging with other youth from our Diocese.

DM: How did you come to be a youth delegate for our congregation?

EB: In short, our past Interim Rector Rachel Endicott asked me if I would have liked to be a Youth Presence at last year's general convention and I said I would love to. And that's how I got the title "An Official Youth Presence of the Diocese of Olympia."

DM: What are the requirements for being a youth delegate for St. Alban's?

EB: There are really no requirements for being a youth delegate, well besides being a youth there are only benefits. For example I did not have to pay a registration fee for the election of the 8th Bishop, or fill out any registration at all. Kathy Hamilton, the Missioner for Youth & Young Adults, mails me a letter asking me if I would be able to represent the youth at an event like general convention.

The only thing that I have to do in order to represent the Youth of St. Alban's and of the Diocese is to call or email Shannon (Kathy's assistant) or Kathy herself. That's how easy it really is. Oh! St. Alban's Vestry Adopts Endowment Fund



At its May 1 meeting, the Vestry of St. Alban's adopted the Endowment Fund submitted to it by the Planned Giving Committee. By signing the Enabling Resolutions of the Fund and supporting documents, the vestry officially allows the fund to be implemented.

Established by the Vestry last year, the Planned Giving Committee (PGC) was asked to develop a program and procedures to encourage members of St. Alban's to consider the opportunity to make planned gifts to our church. The committee created and presented to the vestry all the charter documents that allow the program to be established. The next step is to create a Legacy Society to recognize those who make planned gifts.

The members of the PGC include Daisy Beach, Barbara Lagazzino, Reilly Mannery, Dan Mullene, and Maryellen Young. Tom Councill was a member until he moved and Lorrie Pruitt participated in the beginning planning and now serves as an ex officio advising member.

The Endowment Fund is part of our ministry of Planned Giving. This is a ministry of guidance and stewardship that can assist members of our congregation in end of life preparation and estate planning. It is also about raising awareness about how our spiritual legacy is intertwined with our financial legacy.

A planned gift can be any gift made now or during our lifetime as part of our estate, whether by Will, a trust or other means. The value of a planned gift may be received and invested for future use in one of two ways: as an endowment from which only the income may be used,

and as a memorial fund from which all of the value may be used.

Making a planned gift to St. Alban's is an important part of our full life stewardship planning. The church teaches that everything we have is a gift from God. Careful management of financial assets should include plans for orderly disposition at death. The legacy we leave for the church is a witness to our faith and will help ensure that the ministry of the church will continue after we are gone.

When we name St. Alban's, the Diocese, or an Episcopal institution as the beneficiary of a planned gift, typically those assets will be placed in an endowment fund or a memorial fund of our congregation or other named institution.

Earnings from endowments are used for mission and ministry beyond the normal operating budget, and in accordance with any specific designations we may choose to make. Memorial funds are typically used in their entirety for mission and ministry beyond the normal operating budget, also in accordance with any designations.

Members of the PGC and the Vestry work together to make decisions about the acceptance of gifts, their disposition into these funds and how the gifts are best used.

Planned Giving refers to gifts made from assets accumulated during one's lifetime. Usually these gifts are part of an overall estate plan and are typically made by including a gift to the church in your will, in a charitable remainder trust, with a gift of life insurance, a gift of property, or a gift of retirement assets.

The PGC will be providing more information to the congregation on how our members can contribute to the endowment fund.

As noted above, the next phase in developing our Endowment Fund is the creation of a Legacy Society. This is an organization created by the church to honor the act of giving to God and assuring the future of our service to people in Christ's name.

The Legacy Society provides an opportunity to commend and graciously thank those who make a gift now or in their financial commitment in their estate plan for the mission of the church. This will be done through special events and actions to celebrate their gifts.

The Legacy Society does not raise funds. Money from a planned gift goes directly from contributors to the beneficiary church or institution.

Membership to the Legacy Society includes any person who has made a provision in their estate plan for St. Alban's, the Diocese, or an Episcopal institution, as are persons making a current gift to any Episcopal endowment fund. By allowing our name to be added to the rolls of the Legacy Society, our gift will stand quietly as a witness of our thanks for the gifts we have received from God now and to future generations.

John & Chris Greenlaw: Our family has attended and been members of St. Albans since about 1995. We have very much enjoyed our extended church family and the friends we have made here and found great comfort in the sincere fellowship unique to our parish. It is not really in our nature to talk or write extensively about ourselves, but Al Walker has been persistent in drumming up business for his articles, and we felt compelled to help.
