We thought about how Peter's relationship with Jesus mirrored our individual lives, as well as, the life of St. Alban's as a congregation with God. There was time for prayer and contemplation which ended with a eucharist where we offered our prayers of hope for the congregation. Sunday morning we created an action plan for the vestry built on our discussions from Saturday. We are moving forward as a team.

There is much to be done this year at St. Alban's and my prayer is that we will move ourselves from a mindset of poverty and loss to one of abundance and hope. I pray for St. Alban's to flourish. The Joy of the Cross-ward Path *By the Rev. John Leech*

An invitation to a journey lies at the heart of Lent – a pilgrimage to places we could not choose to go, a journey into Christ, in Christ, and with Christ; a path that leads up to Jerusalem to the procession of the Palms and the Passion of Holy Week, and onward from Cross to glory.

We are invited onto a path of joy that looks at first like sorrow – and certainly contains it – but contains within it a larger purpose and a future with hope beyond hope.

In faith we walk with Jesus this Lent. Each week we learn more about his invitation:

1. Jesus calls us to repent and believe in the good news (Mark 1:9-15).
2. Jesus invites us to take up the cross (Mark 8:31-38).
3. Jesus calls us to true worship (John 2:13-22).
4. Jesus is lifted up for our salvation (John 3:14-21).
5. Jesus invites us to follow and serve (John 12:20-33)

This Lent we will look at these themes of deep celebration – of joy found in following and in serving, always looking to Jesus as the source of salvation and the founder of our faith.

How will you take up this invitation? Join us on Lenten Sundays and Wednesdays, as we explore these themes, and seek together what it means to live in the joy of the journey on the cross-ward way of Christ.

What we are doing this for: to make the church a safe and a joyous place for all people. We appreciate your help!

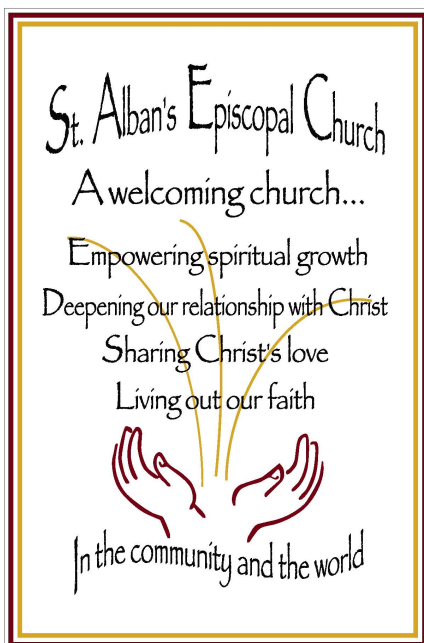

Life in the Body of Christ* - Busy as a Bee

Although Liz has an extremely busy life right now, she knows the importance of taking time to listen for God's guidance. It's a good thing for St. Alban's that she does because, when God called her to serve on Vestry, Liz knew it was the right thing for her to do and she knew it was the right time. She heard God's call and said "yes." If that wasn't enough, she also knew it was God's will for her to take the position of Senior Warden this year.

It seems God had His hand on Liz from an early age. She grew up in Burien where she and her family attended St. Elizabeth's Episcopal Church. She graduated from Highline High School, Class of 1983. The youngest of three children, she has both an older sister and an older brother. College had always been encouraged in their family until it was time for Liz to go. At that time she heard an unspoken message, mostly from her mother, that said it would be better if she didn't attend college, but that she got a job instead. Perhaps it was the expense of her two older sibling's education that came across as a burden to young Liz's sensitive spirit.

Her early jobs were secretarial-type work. The first was with an international bank in Seattle, and then came a position at Thousand Trails Campgrounds. It was at that time that she met her husband, John Bee. In addition to her job, Liz was on staff as a volunteer at Diocesan House. She was speaking at a Cursillo-type retreat that John happened to attend. They were married in 1985 at St. Elizabeth's Episcopal Church. John worked as a longshoreman and had inherited his parent's home, so this young couple was off to a good start, moving into a fully furnished home in Shoreline. They are still there twenty-six years later.

Liz took a job in Everett and began soul searching. In 1987, she was asked to attend youth ministry training in St. Louis. While there she met a psychologist who told what it was like to help a four-year old boy who had been molested. When she inquired for more information, she realized it wasn't her voice speaking. She came back home determined to quit her job and become a counselor. She started her academic career at Shoreline Community College. After her second quarter she decided that she could manage both school and family, so she decided to have a child. However, after Emily was born, it became obvious that she needed to stay home with her family. Then their son, John, came along confirming her decision. Later, after Meredith was born, friends encouraged her to go back to school, but Liz is happy that she was able to stay home with her children for thirteen years.

Liz got her AA at Shoreline and her Bachelors' degree at Seattle Pacific University. She is now doing an internship at Valley Cities Counseling Agency in Auburn. She will graduate with her Master's in June as a LMFT. Most of her work is with children, four to eighteen years old and their families. She uses play therapy to help these children deal with the trauma of broken homes, death, and depression. Liz wishes she had more time for fun things like camping and walks on the beach, but I think she would agree that, if you are in God's will and in His timing, its okay to be "busy as a bee," because somehow it all gets done.

The Book for Lent 2012

(The following has been condensed for the newsletter)

Dear Ones,

As you well know over the last few years I have selected a book to encourage our diocese to read together. My book selection for the Lent . . . the Bible. As Episcopalians, we hear the Bible, if in church, quite frequently, but putting it in a continuous context, focusing on it more as to story and study, and increasing our biblical literacy, we do not often major in that.

This would be my hope in our journey in Lent. I have to say I was inspired by a new project I was invited into, The Center for Biblical Studies, started by the Rev. Merek Zibriskie, Episcopal priest and Rector of St. Thomas' Episcopal Church, Fort Washington, PA.

The Center for Biblical Studies has designed a one-year reading schedule to help those who commit as individuals or as members of a church, a church school or a diocese to read successfully through the entire Bible in a year's time. The CBS intentionally focuses on reading the entire Bible, reading the books of the Bible in sequence and ensuring that a psalm and a portion of the New Testament are read each day in order to provide strong spiritual daily content to sustain readers working through the entire Bible.

The Center has come up with a schedule which will be available on our diocesan website, but also on their own.

As for the Bible, I am often asked which "version" to get. The translation is certainly your preference, but I like the NRSV... *

So, I hope and pray we will use Lent to begin a discipline of more regular biblical reading and increasing our literacy of the primary book of our faith. I will be joining you and have been blessed by my reading so far.

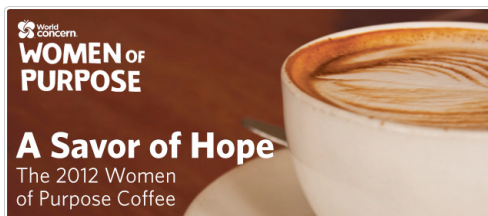

So, along those same lines the Vestry decided to apply the same idea to the Parish Picnic. There are many plus's about having the picnic at the park and we've always had a wonderful time. Yet, as our church is aging, some minuses have started to appear. I have heard several complaints from people who don't attend any longer because the terrain is too difficult to walk on and the weather is always cold in our picnic spot, even if the sun is out. So trying something different might make it more comfortable for those people.

On the plus side of having the picnic at St. Alban's:

- We are not dependent on the weather – we have the option to go indoors if needed
- We have a huge property we can spread out on – we might as well utilize it
- We can have more choices of activities – especially for the kids
- Our terrain is level and easy to walk on
- It would be a way of promoting St. Alban's in the neighborhood
- We could invite our neighbors
- Become more of a community church
- Perhaps you could even bring your pet

I hope you agree with the Vestry that it's worth trying something different. If it doesn't work out we can go back to the park next year. I invite you to call or email me with your feedback.

Planned Gifts *By Maryellen Young*

In January I talked about how Memorial Funds are administered. In February I talked about how the Endowment fund is managed. This month I would like to talk about how gifts to St. Alban's from your estate plans or Planned Gifts are handled.

First I'd like to mention that there is no specified amount to gift from your estate plans. Any amount is fine. The important thing is to think about should God be part of your estate? Even if a gift is a percentage, none of us know how much we will have at the end. No gift is too small.

Leaving a Gift

There are a variety of ways of leaving a gift. Here are just a few:

- As a beneficiary of a will, leaving a specified amount or a percentage
- As a beneficiary of an investment account
- As a beneficiary of a CD at a bank
- As a beneficiary of a life insurance policy

When listing the church as a beneficiary, it can be listed as one of multiple beneficiaries or as the only beneficiary. There are many other ways to leave a gift.

Designating a Gift

Gifts can be directed to the Endowment Fund, the Memorial Fund or just left to St. Alban's.

1. Gifts designated for St. Alban's Endowment Fund go directly to the Endowment Fund. The body of the gift is always retained and only the appreciation and earnings are spent in accordance with the Spending Rules.
2. Gifts designated in memoriam go directly to the Memorial Fund. Memorial Fund gifts can be spent in their entirety in accordance with policies on the use of said funds.
3. Gifts not designated for either of the above funds are considered undesignated and will be divided as follows: 75% to the Endowment Fund and 25% to the Memorial Fund.

Purpose of a Gift

The most flexibility is available to the church if the gift is given without restrictions as to how the gift is used. If there is a specific purpose you have in mind, it's always good to check with the church in advance. I always remember hearing about the church that was left a bequest designated for boutonnières for the ushers. We do have a Gift Acceptance Policy that states: "The Vestry, upon advice of the Board, reserves the right to decline any gift that does not further the mission or goals of the Parish. Also, any gifts that would create an administrative burden or cause the Parish to incur excessive expenses may be declined."

Once you notify us that you have included the church as part of your estate plans, you are automatically a member of St. Alban's Legacy Society and the Diocese of Olympia's Bishop Society. We currently have 14 members of St. Alban's Legacy Society who are recognized on a plaque in the Sanctuary. Sunday June 24th has been designated as Legacy Sunday for 2012 where we acknowledge St. Alban's Day and our members of the Legacy Society. We would love to have you join us. There is a brochure in the Parish Hall or you can notify the Church office or any member of the Planned Giving Committee.
