LEGACY SUNDAY CELEBRATION

THE REST OF THE STORY"— "It Is Well with My Soul"

When peace like a river, attendeth my way, When sorrows like sea billows roll; Whatever my lot, Thou has taught me to say, It is well, it is well, with my soul.

This hymn, sung at our June 18 service, was penned by hymnist Horatio Spafford and composed by Philip Bliss. The story behind it is an illustration of ultimate faith and trust.

It was written after traumatic events in Spafford's life, beginning with the death of his son at age two and the Great Chicago Fire of 1871. Spafford was a lawyer and was heavily invested in property damaged by the fire. His business interests were again hit by the 1873 economic downturn, at which time he planned to travel to Europe with his family on the SS Ville du Havre. While he finished up business issues, Spafford sent his wife and four daughters ahead without him. The ship with his family struck another ship and sank within 12 minutes. Spafford's wife Anna survived and sent him the now-famous telegram, "Saved alone..."

Travelling to meet his grieving wife, Spafford was inspired to write the words to the hymn as his ship passed near where his daughters had died. (Composer Bliss named his tune *Ville du Havre*, from the name of the ship.)

The Spaffords later had three more children, losing a son Horatio to scarlet fever at age four. Spafford questioned whether these tragedies were punishment from God, and he was in danger of losing his faith.

The family of four moved to Jerusalem, Spafford explaining, "Jerusalem is where my Lord lived, suffered and conquered, and I wish to learn how to live, suffer and especially to conquer." They remained in Jerusalem, doing philanthropic work.

PATRIOTIC STORY TO GET US READY FOR THE 4TH OF JULY

If you were in church Sunday, June 25th, you may have heard Dan Mullene's Homily. In it, he told us a story about a high school classmate of his whose step-father was the recipient of an American flag from the World War II site of Normandy Beach. We thought you might enjoy hearing the story again, as we celebrate one of our most patriotic holidays, the 4th of July.

Dan Mullene's Homily:

Let me, share with you a story I heard recently that I hope you will find inspiring.

I am working on a committee to set up the 50th reunion of my high school, Shoreline High. I attended a meeting this week to work on that event.

After the meeting, we spent a few minutes talking about memorable vacations, and one of our classmates, Marilyn Wakefield Perry, shared details about a vacation she had taken a few years ago at Normandy Beach in France.

She told us of her experience in being on the beach with her daughter and son-in-law. It was late in the day and they were the only visitors there.

Towards the end of their visit, she went to a monument there that included sculpture and poles holding the flags of the different nations that had defended France and Europe in that great battle. She watched quietly as two French women lowered first the French flag, and then the American flag.

Caught up in the moment, she took what she now describes in retrospect as a bold action. She asked the women if she could have the American flag. She folded it up and held it close to her chest, as she took in the moment and looked back on the beach.

Marilyn told us that suddenly, she did not feel alone, but instead felt surrounded by the thousands of men and women who had fought so valiantly there to secure the freedom that you and I enjoy today.

She described it in this way: "You could feel the quiet whispers, the long-ago fury, the panic, the sadness of loss...almost impossible to put into words."

Marilyn brought that flag back home with her, where she gave it to her step-father, who had served in Pearl Harbor during World War Two, on board the battleship USS Maryland when the Japanese attacked.

She knew it would have meaning to him, and it did. Because she had the courage to take an action that her heart called out to her, she was able to honor the legacy of his service to our country.

And that flag that flew over Normandy beach, that flag that accompanied Marilyn home, that same flag given to her father, now flies proudly in the Edmonds American Legion post, as silent remembrance to us of the power of the sacrifices of so many who went before

By the way, her stepfather, Don Raleigh, just turned 99 this month, and is still an active member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars post in Edmonds. You will see him marching in the Edmonds 4th of July parade!
