The Vestry met last Monday for our April meeting. Among the things we discussed and decided on, here are the five most important.

First, The Sabbatical

We continue to prepare for our Sabbatical Time. It was pointed out that the last time St. Alban's had a priest go on sabbatical was 2004 when Dorsey McConnell was the Rector. For my part, I have not been on sabbatical before. In essence, this is all new to us. There are likely many questions and concerns.

One prime concern is about clergy coverage during this time. We have secured the services of Rev. David Hahn for the entire three months. David is a Lutheran Pastor and serves as the Synodical Staff Director of Formation and Learning/LiVE Project Manager of the NW WA Synod of the ELCA. I am really excited about the prospects for faith formation you all will have under his care, and about the relationships you will build together over those three months. We are currently working on scheduling a Sunday when David can join us for our services, experience our worship, and be introduced to you all.

To address questions and concerns, there will be a couple of times to discuss what I will be doing, what I will be studying, and what my hopes and plans are. Besides answering questions and concerns, I trust that these sessions will help me be better prepared and better focused during this time.

But the Vestry and I want to emphasize that the sabbatical is a mutual undertaking – time for renewal, focus, and rest for the congregation as well. The Episcopal Church offers a program using the "Congregational Vitality Assessment Tool" which will help us explore our strengths as a faith community and point out areas that could use more attention. The Vitality Assessment will compliment the work we are already doing with the Transforming Communities program. The first presentation and discussion time will be at our monthly third Wednesday Soup Supper, this coming Wednesday, April 17. The next will be coffee hour discussions on April 28.

Second, Vestry Retreat

The Vestry Retreat will be held on Saturday, April 27. We'll be spending the day preparing for the sabbatical, planning a general overview for the year, and prayerfully discerning God's vision for us as a congregation. Please hold us all in your prayers.

Third, Delegates for the Electing Convention

As you know, our diocese will be electing our next Diocesan Bishop on Saturday, May 18. Our delegates, Cyndi and Craig Jacobson are moving to Nevada and so have resigned. The Vestry, following the strict rules governing eligible voters, has elected Susan and Eric Hanson to replace them.

Fourth, St. Alban's Celebration

Looking ahead, our annual Celebration of St. Alban is scheduled for Saturday and Sunday, **June 22 and 23**. This is **our 70th anniversary**. In 1954, St. Alban's was recognized at the Diocesan Convention as a Mission of the Diocese. Please mark your calendars as we celebrate 70 years of faithful witness and service in this community.

And last, Celtic Christmas Concert Benefiting Chase Lake School

Looking even further ahead, please mark your calendars for Saturday, **December 21**, for the return of our Celtic Christmas Concert featuring Jeff Johnson and his ensemble. It has been several, long, Covidinterrupted years since we have been able to put this concert on, so we are delighted to again welcome the community for an evening of beautiful music, good fellowship, and support for Chase Lake School.

The Episcopal Church's Joint Nominating Committee for the Election of the Presiding Bishop has announced the names of the bishops it will nominate to succeed Presiding Bishop Michael Curry.

Its nominees are:

- The Rt. Rev. J. Scott Barker | Diocese of Nebraska (Biography)
- The Rt. Rev. Daniel G. P. Gutiérrez | Episcopal Diocese of Pennsylvania (**Biography**)
- The Rt. Rev. Sean Rowe | Episcopal Diocese of Northwestern Pennsylvania, Episcopal Diocese of Western New York (**Biography**)
- The Rt. Rev. Robert Wright | Episcopal Diocese of Atlanta (<u>Biography</u>)

The <u>General Convention website</u> includes photos and links to each bishop's biography on their diocesan websites. The four names will be formally submitted to the General Convention during a joint session on June 25, a day before the House of Bishops is scheduled to elect the 28th presiding bishop. Curry's nine-year term concludes Oct. 31, 2024. The presiding bishop-elect's nine-year term officially begins Nov. 1, 2024.

<u>DIETRICH BONHOEFFER – d. April 9, 1945</u> <u>Pastor & Theologian</u> <u>German Christian Martyr of World War II</u>

This bright young Lutheran pastor was only twentyfour when he participated in his first public protest against Nazism and the complicity of the Christian churches in that regime's rise to power. He was one of the leaders of the "Confessing Church," a Protestant group that resisted Hitler and the Nazi party. In 1935 he was the founder and dean of a seminary at Finkenwald, Germany, which served that Church body. It was there that he wrote his two most famous published works: *Life Together* and *The Cost of Discipleship*.

As the Nazi ring closed in upon him and the "Confessing Church," he had an opportunity for asylum in the United States, which he declined. He was arrested and jailed in 1943 and from his cell he helped plan an assassination of Adolf Hitler. The assassination failed and Bonhoeffer's involvement was discovered, so he was whisked off to Buchenwald concentration camp.

But his life was spared, for reasons we do not know, and he was transferred to Schoenberg Prison. There he served as chaplain to fellow inmates and on a Sunday in 1945, immediately following divine services, he was summoned by the guards and taken by automobile to Flossenburg Prison where he was summarily hanged. That was on April 9. Dietrich was thirty-nine years old. The crumbling German Reich formally surrendered twenty-eight days later.

DAY BY DAY REFLECTIONS

John 14:27 -- Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled.

The Episcopal Church commemorates German theologian and pastor Dietrich Bonhoeffer for his courage in publicly standing against the powers of Nazism. Considered an enemy of the state, Bonhoeffer traveled to the U.S. in 1939, where he could have remained but instead chose to return to his homeland. The Gestapo arrested and imprisoned Bonhoeffer in 1943. He was executed with six other resisters on April 9, 1945, only 11 days before U.S. troops liberated the camp.

Bonhoeffer's voluminous writings include my own well-read copy of *Letters and Papers from Prison*. Of the many notes I've made, I especially appreciate his observation that time is the most precious gift we have. A man of profound faith, Bonhoeffer lived Jesus's teachings fearlessly leading services in prison and pastoring fellow prisoners as well as some of the prison guards. He continued preaching until his death, and his last words were, "This is the end – for me, the beginning of life."
