This coming Sunday, October 5, will be the conclusion of the Season of Creation. As in past years, we end with the Feast of St. Francis.

Francis was famous for preaching to birds, consoling and counseling a wolf, and seeing God present in all creation. So, part of our celebration includes the blessing of our pets, service animals, and even plants. Please feel free to bring these creatures to church. You can bring them in person for a blessing during the service, between and after the services outside, or even just a photo of them. And invite your friends, family, and neighbors to do the same. This is a great day to welcome them into our worshipping community.

Next week we'll go back to our regular Prayer Book liturgies.

Every liturgy has its own nuances and insights into the Divine Nature, highlights different aspects of God, presents Jesus and his earthly ministry in a different light, and emphasizes unique graces and gifts of the Holy Spirit.

One thing that has struck me while praying the Season of Creation liturgy this year is this section from the Eucharistic Prayer.

"On the night before he died, Jesus came to table with those he loved. Recalling his own actions of feeding the poor and eating with the outcast, he took bread, gave thanks to You, broke it, and gave it to them, and said 'Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this in memory of me."

I have heard, prayed, studied, and preached on this for 64 years, now, but this season I heard it anew.

I know the importance in first century Jewish culture about eating together, the care and intent Jesus took eating with all kinds of people, the importance of table fellowship, and the Feeding of the 5000 and 4000 as inferences to the Eucharist, but I hadn't made the connection of all those things influencing Jesus in ways that led to what he did at the Last Supper.

I had always interpreted the Feeding Stories, for

example, as observations back from the perspective of the Last Supper, rather than them being influences **on** the Last Supper.

It's kind of like looking through a lens from the opposite direction. Or through a lens rather than into a mirror. The Feeding Stories were not backward-looking reflections on the Eucharist; the experiences of all those meals and the feeding of the multitudes led to what Jesus said and did in the Upper Room and to our Eucharist.

That's an entirely different perspective. And a revelation, to me at least.

And then, earlier this week, I read in the *Seattle Times* about a program that promotes home bakers baking bread for Food Banks. Community Loaves, a Seattle-area nonprofit founded during the Pandemic, is now active in four or five states (only where regulations allow homemade things to be donated to food banks). The program has fairly strict guidelines, authorized recipes, and even prescribed ingredients.

As a home baker myself, I thought, this is part of my calling!

I haven't had the opportunity to contact them yet, but I did look them up online and found that there are several groups nearby, including in Edmonds and West Seattle, that organize baking and distributions to local food banks.

I know we have several people in our congregation who love to bake, and I commend Community Loaves to you. Here's a hot link to the story <u>Community Loaves</u> or https://www.seattletimes.com/seattle-news/health/seattle-nonprofit-helps-home-bakers-donate-fresh-bread-to-food-banks/

Just think of needing to be reliant on whatever is available through a food bank, and having the opportunity to receive freshly baked, with love, care, and divinely inspired generosity, Bread.

To paraphrase our Eucharistic Prayer, "Recalling our own occasions of coming to the Lord's Table, we took a little flour, water, yeast, and salt; blessed it; baked it; sent it out; shared it with people we will likely never meet; declared that it is 'Given for you' beloved child of God; and did all this in remembrance of our Lord and Savior."

Remembrance literally means to put members back together. In our prayers, both our liturgical words and our physical work, we are part of Jesus' ministry of putting this world back together.

May God bless us with and in this work.
