Prelude

Welcome to St. Alban's Episcopal Church. We're here in Edmonds, WA, and wherever you are in the world, we're honored that you have welcomed us into your life this evening, as together we worship the God of all creation incarnate in Jesus of Nazareth. Whether you're with us for an hour or a lifetime, we hope and trust that you will find this a refuge that nourishes the Holy Spirit within you.

Before we begin, we acknowledge that we are blessed to be situated on traditional and ancestral Snohomish, Coast Salish land. They cared for this land for millennia before it was taken from them. We honor them, and pray for the wisdom to care for it as well as they. We recognize that we are living among them still, so we are seeking ways of building relationships so that, working together, we can be better stewards of this place and all its people.

Bidding Prayer

Beloved in Christ, in this Christmastide, let it be our care and delight to hear again the messages of the Angels, and in heart and mind to go to Bethlehem and see the Babe lying in a manger.

Let us read and mark in Holy Scripture the tale of the loving purposes of God - the glorious Redemption brought to us by this holy Child Jesus, and let us make this place glad with our carols of praise.

But first, let us pray for the needs of his whole world; for peace, goodwill, and justice over all the earth, especially in Ukraine, Palestine and

Israel, Lebanon, Thailand and Cambodia, Myanmar, South Sudan, and everywhere that there is violence;

for the mission and unity of the Church for which he died, especially in this country and within this city; for Fernely and Irma Robles and the ministries of Templo Emanuel; Sarah the Archbishop of Canterbury-Designate and for the Anglican Church of Canada; Sean Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church , for Phil Bishop of the D and Diocese of Olympia and for churches of our diocese including Holy Spirit, Battle Ground and St. Matthew's, Castle Rock; for Jim and all deacons; for Greg and all priests; and for this congregation, especially Edith Lawrence for whom we give thanks this week, for those who serve on the Altar Guild, and for those who, through their generosity, empower all our ministries, especially Mona Carter and the other members of the Legacy Society.

And because this of all things would rejoice his heart, let us remember in his name:

the poor and helpless, especially those served by Episcopal Relief and Development, the Refugee Resettlement Office, and Women's Spirit Coalition;

the hungry and oppressed, for those served by the Edmonds Food Bank and our Blessings Pantry;

the sick and those who mourn, for Marge, Marilee, Susan D., Jack and Donna, Judy Fleenor, Tom, Shirley Clark, and Howard; for those ministered to by the Alcoholics Anonymous group that meets here, and those for whom we prayer aloud or in the silence of our hearts;

the lonely and the unloved;

the aged and the little children: for the work and ministries of Chase Lake Community School, West Edmonds Cooperative Preschool, Scout Troop 300, and Girl Scout Troop 46254;

and those who know not the Savior Jesus, or who love him not, or who by sin have grieved his heart of love.

Lastly, let us remember before God his pure and lowly Mother, his obedient and caring Father, and all those who rejoice with us, but upon another shore and in a greater light, especially those we name now, and that multitude which no one can number, whose hope was in the Word made flesh, and with whom, in this Savior Jesus, we are one forever more.

These prayers and praises let us offer up to the throne of heaven.

The Almighty God bless us with holy grace; Christ give us the joys of everlasting life; and to the fellowship of the citizens above may the King of Angels bring us all. *Amen.*

A reading from Gospel according to Saint Luke; Chapter 1 beginning with the first verse.

1Since many have undertaken to set down an orderly account of the events that have been fulfilled among us, ²just as they were handed on to us by those who from the beginning were eyewitnesses and servants of the word, ³I too decided, after investigating everything carefully from the very first, to write an orderly account for you, most excellent Theophilus, ⁴so that you may know the truth concerning the things about which you have been instructed.

26 In the sixth month the angel Gabriel was sent by God to a town in Galilee called Nazareth, ²⁷to a virgin engaged to a man whose name was Joseph, of the house of David. The virgin's name was Mary. ²⁸And he came to her and said, 'Greetings, favored one! The Lord is with you.'29But she was much perplexed by his words and pondered what sort of greeting this might be. 30The angel said to her, 'Do not be afraid, Mary, for you have found favor with God. ³¹And now, you will conceive in your womb and bear a son, and you will name him Jesus. ³²He will be great, and will be called the Son of the Most High, and the Lord God will give to him the throne of his ancestor David. ³³He will reign over the house of Jacob forever, and of his kingdom there will be no end.' ³⁴Mary said to the angel, 'How can this be, since I am a virgin?' ^{*} ³⁵The angel said to her, 'The Holy Spirit will come upon you, and the power of the Most High will overshadow you; therefore the child to be born* will be holy; he will be called Son of God. ³⁶And now, your relative Elizabeth in her old age has also conceived a son; and this is the sixth month for her who was said to be barren. ³⁷For nothing will be impossible with God.' ³⁸Then Mary said, 'Here am I, the servant of the Lord; let it be with me according to your word.' Then the angel departed from her.

- ⁹He makes grass to grow upon the mountains * and green plants to serve mankind.

- ¹²But the LORD has pleasure in those who fear him, * in those who await his gracious favor.

 he has blessed your children within you.

- ¹⁵He has established peace on your borders; * he satisfies you with the finest wheat.
- ¹⁶He sends out his command to the earth, * and his word runs very swiftly.
- ¹⁷He gives snow like wool; * he scatters hoarfrost like ashes.
- ¹⁸He scatters his hail like bread crumbs; * who can stand against his cold?

And Elizabeth was filled with the Holy Spirit ⁴² and exclaimed with a loud cry, 'Blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb. ⁴³ And why has this happened to me, that the mother of my Lord

comes to me? ⁴⁴ For as soon as I heard the sound of your greeting, the child in my womb leapt for joy. ⁴⁵ And blessed is she who believed that there would be a fulfilment of what was spoken to her by the Lord.'

Luke 1:57 - 66 The Birth of John the Baptist

⁵⁷ Now the time came for Elizabeth to give birth, and she bore a son. ⁵⁸ Her neighbours and relatives heard that the Lord had shown his great mercy to her, and they rejoiced with her.

⁵⁹ On the eighth day they came to circumcise the child, and they were going to name him Zechariah after his father. ⁶⁰ But his mother said, 'No; he is to be called John.' ⁶¹ They said to her, 'None of your relatives has this name.' ⁶² Then they began motioning to his father to find out what name he wanted to give him. ⁶³ He asked for a writing-tablet and wrote, 'His name is John.' And all of them were amazed. ⁶⁴ Immediately his mouth was opened and his tongue freed, and he began to speak, praising God. ⁶⁵ Fear came over all their neighbours, and all these things were talked about throughout the entire hill country of Judea. ⁶⁶ All who heard them pondered them and said, 'What then will this child become?' ⁶⁷ Then his father Zechariah was filled with the Holy Spirit and spoke this prophecy:

⁶⁸ 'Blessed be the Lord God of Israel, for he has looked favourably on his people and redeemed them.

⁶⁹ He has raised up a mighty saviour for us in the house of his servant David,

⁷⁰ as he spoke through the mouth of his holy prophets from of old,

- that we would be saved from our enemies and from the hand of all who hate us.
- ⁷² Thus he has shown the mercy promised to our ancestors, and has remembered his holy covenant,
- ⁷³ the oath that he swore to our ancestor Abraham, to grant us ⁷⁴ that we, being rescued from the hands of our enemies, might serve him without fear, ⁷⁵ in holiness and righteousness before him all our days.

- ⁷⁹ to give light to those who sit in darkness and in the shadow of death, to guide our feet into the way of peace.'
- ⁸⁰ The child grew and became strong in spirit, and he was in the wilderness until the day he appeared publicly to Israel.

Luke 2:1-20

2 In those days a decree went out from Emperor Augustus that all the world should be registered. ² This was the first registration and was taken while Quirinius was governor of Syria. ³ All went to their own towns to be registered. ⁴ Joseph also went from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to the city of David called Bethlehem, because he was descended from the house and family of David. ⁵ He went to be registered with Mary, to whom he was engaged and who was expecting a child. ⁶ While they were there, the time came for her to deliver her child. ⁷ And she gave birth

to her firstborn son and wrapped him in bands of cloth, and laid him in a manger, because there was no place for them in the inn.

⁸ In that region there were shepherds living in the fields, keeping watch over their flock by night. ⁹Then an angel of the Lord stood before them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified. ¹⁰ But the angel said to them, 'Do not be afraid; for see—I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people: 11 to you is born this day in the city of David a Saviour, who is the Messiah, [a] the Lord. ¹² This will be a sign for you: you will find a child wrapped in bands of cloth and lying in a manger.' 13 And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host, b praising God and saying, ¹⁴ 'Glory to God in the highest heaven,

and on earth peace among those whom he favours!'[c]

¹⁵ When the angels had left them and gone into heaven, the shepherds said to one another, 'Let us go now to Bethlehem and see this thing that has taken place, which the Lord has made known to us.' 16 So they went with haste and found Mary and Joseph, and the child lying in the manger. ¹⁷ When they saw this, they made known what had been told them about this child; ¹⁸ and all who heard it were amazed at what the shepherds told them. 19 But Mary treasured all these words and pondered them in her heart. 20 The shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all they had heard and seen, as it had been told them.

Matthew 2:13 - 18 The Escape to Egypt

A Reading from the Gospel according to Saint Matthew, Chapter 2 beginning with the 13th verse.

¹³ Now after they had left, an angel of the Lord appeared to Joseph in a dream and said, 'Get up, take the child and his mother, and flee to Egypt, and remain there until I tell you; for Herod is about to search for the child, to destroy him.' ¹⁴ Then Joseph^[a] got up, took the child and his mother by night, and went to Egypt, ¹⁵ and remained there until the death of Herod. This was to fulfil what had been spoken by the Lord through the prophet, 'Out of Egypt I have called my son.'

¹⁶ When Herod saw that he had been tricked by the wise men, ^[b] he was infuriated, and he sent and killed all the children in and around Bethlehem who were two years old or under, according to the time that he had learned from the wise men. ^[c] ¹⁷ Then was fulfilled what had been spoken through the prophet Jeremiah:

18 'A voice was heard in Ramah,wailing and loud lamentation,Rachel weeping for her children;she refused to be consoled, because they are no more.'

Jeremiah 31:15 - 17 (Read Responsively)

Thus says the Lord: A voice is heard in Ramah, lamentation and bitter weeping.

Rachel is weeping for her children; she refuses to be comforted for her children, because they are no more.

¹⁶Thus says the Lord: Keep your voice from weeping, and your eyes from tears; for there is a reward for your work, says the Lord:
they shall come back from the land of the enemy;

¹⁷ there is hope for your future, says the Lord: *your children shall come back to their own country.*

The Collect for the Holy Innocents (December 29)

The Lord be with you. *And also with you.* Let us pray.

We remember today, O God, the slaughter of the holy innocents of Bethlehem by King Herod. Receive, we pray, into the arms of your mercy all innocent victims; and by your great might frustrate the designs of evil tyrants and establish your rule of justice, love, and peace; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. *Amen*.

John 1:1 - 18

A reading from Gospel according to Saint John; Chapter 1 beginning with the first verse.

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into

being. What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it.

There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light. The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world.

He was in the world, and the world came into being through him; yet the world did not know him. He came to what was his own, and his own people did not accept him. But to all who received him, who believed in his name, he gave power to become children of God, who were born, not of blood or of the will of the flesh or of the will of man, but of God.

And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth. (John testified to him and cried out, "This was he of whom I said, 'He who comes after me ranks ahead of me because he was before me.") From his fullness we have all received, grace upon grace. The law indeed was given through Moses; grace and truth came through Jesus Christ. No one has ever seen God. It is God the only Son, who is close to the Father's heart, who has made him known.

For a child has been born for us, a son given to us;

authority rests upon his shoulders; and he is named

Wonderful Counsellor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace.

His authority shall grow continually, and there shall be endless peace

for the throne of David and his kingdom. He will establish and uphold it

with justice and with righteousness from this time onwards and for evermore.

The zeal of the Lord of hosts will do this.
