

A NOTE TO PARENTS

One of Jesus's favorite teaching tools was the parable. Parables are little stories that reveal God's ways with us. These stories of fathers, masters, kings, judges, shepherds, farmers, and hosts are not meant to be de-coded into simple statements of belief or morals. They are meant to introduce us to a Person ... to help us recognize him when he acts in our own lives.

In today's parable, a father asks his children for help. One says "Yes," but does nothing. The other says "No!" but then later goes and helps. Jesus asks, "Who really did the father's will?" The answer is so obvious, and the situation in the parable is so instantly recognizable and familiar (especially to parents) that we are tempted to stop right there. It's very easy to take a story like this one, and use it simply as a moral lesson, whose bottom line is "Obey your parents." We need to be reminded that the father in the story stands for God, not for ourselves as parents.

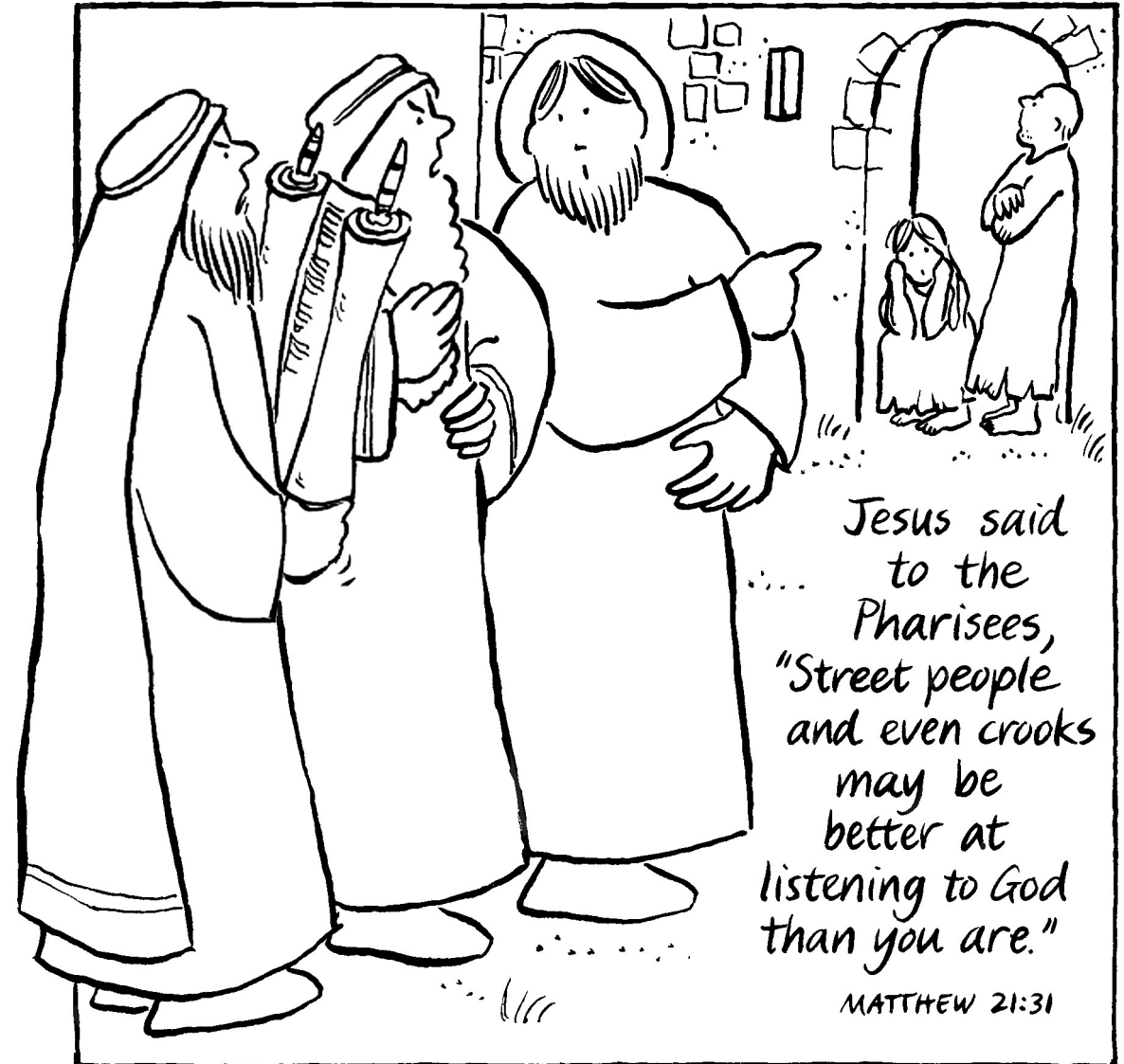
In fact, the story in its setting is a warning to fine-talking people of all kinds, to put their money where their mouth is. Jesus was terribly hard on people who knew all the right answers and were quick to judge or admonish others, but failed to make deep transformations in their own ways of doing things. Parents, like Jesus' Pharisees, are especially at risk here, since they stand as moral teachers or examples for their children.

Talk with your child about *listening*. To listen for God, you need your heart as well as your ears. How do we listen for God's voice in our hearts? What does it sound like? What does it say? What can we do to answer its call? Talk about doing God's work. Jesus used the image of working in a vineyard or a field, to convey the idea of caring for a living, growing thing that is precious to its master. What is our "vineyard" to which our Father calls us? Do we say "yes" or "no"? And do we do what we say? Remind your child that you, as parents, are also children in God's eyes: sometimes you are obedient and sometimes not; sometimes willing and sometimes not. Pray together for the grace to answer God's call.

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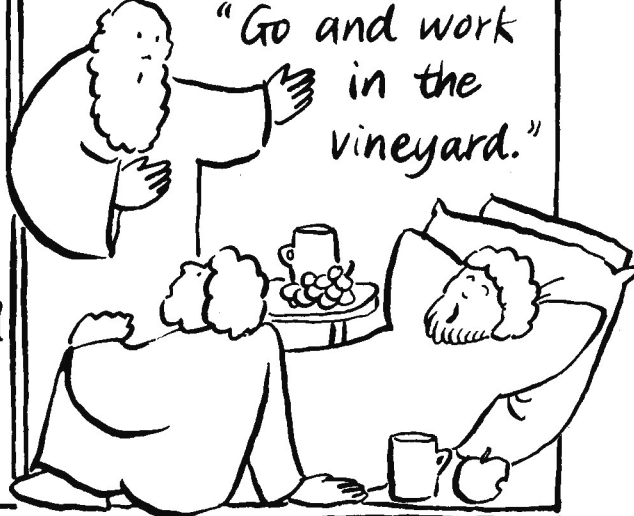

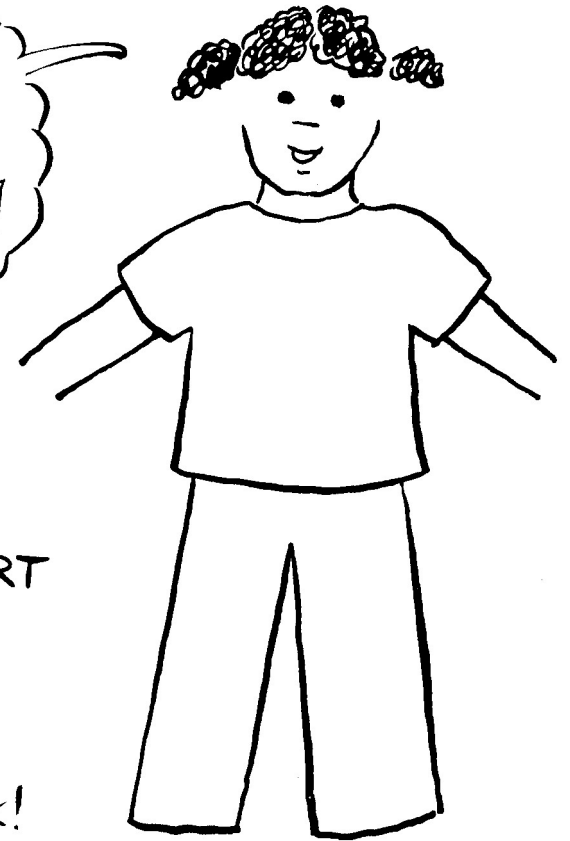
